



TETON COUNTY NAMING REQUIREMENTS

Due to the quantity of subdivisions and roads within Teton County, and in order to eliminate redundancy and make it easier to locate roads, the county recommends the following naming guidelines.

Subdivision Names:

Subdivision names will not be allowed if they are already used, or a form of the main word is in use. For example, if the name “Blue Danube Subdivision” is in existence, “Blue Danube River Subdivision” would not be accepted because of the duplication of “Blue Danube”. The word “Blue” would still be permitted in conjunction with another name such as “Blue Sky” if that name were available.

Road Names:

Road names must follow the appropriate address grid of that jurisdiction the road falls in, if the road is North/South or East/West in orientation. If this rule does not apply (if the road winds, loops, or zigzags), it is strongly encouraged that road names are given thematically to the name of that subdivision, for example: If there is a subdivision named “THE ZOO”, street names could be “Zebra Lane”, “Hippo Way”, “Rhino Road”, etc.

Road names may not be replicated within a subdivision by simply adding a different suffix. For example, “Hippo Road”, “Hippo Lane”, “Hippo Circle”, etc.

In the interest of timely emergency response, taxation, and delivery services, we believe it will be in the best interest of Teton County residents if these guidelines are followed.

In accordance with policy formed by the Teton County Address Committee, and approved by the Board of County Commissioners, all names are to be reviewed and approved by the GIS office of Teton County.

If your subdivision has any of the following names, it will likely not be accepted. All names will be reviewed by the GIS office of Teton County; there may be names not included in this list which will not be accepted:
